



Although they were nosed out of a fourth consecutive Big Nine championship in their final match, Coach Clyde Ridenour's wrestling squad turned in another impressive season slate this year. The Rocket grapplers racked up eight wins before dropping the finishing tiff to Austin for an .888 average. Outstanding in the schedule, however, was the first Rochester win over the perennially strong Cresco Iowans, which helped keep the record of 14 consecutive home mat wins intact.

Nine of the local grapplers qualified for regional competition as Rochester won the sub-regional with 56 points.

In the regional, however, Austin took top honors, and only four of the locals qualified for state tournament competition.

Brough and Cravath each took a third place in the state meet, while Folkert lost a ref's decision and Passe was out-pointed.
