




1. Mark Quirin does some fancy footwork around a disabled goalie opponent. 2. Mark Sparks scores a point for the home team.



WRESTLING TEAM ON UPSWING; SUCCESS SMELLS VERY SWEET


















3. Scott Lawler rests content in another victory 4. Steve Ohly, the only LHS grappler to make it to state, chalks up another win.
